17th SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME (YEAR C)

JUBILEE YEAR OF MERCY

Today's first reading follows closely on Abraham's welcome to the three strangers we heard last week. When they departed, they went towards Sodom, where they received violent treatment after being welcomed by Lot, Abraham's nephew.

The theme is Prayer of Intercession, or Petition, asking favours from God. (We are told of course, that Prayer of Praise is more pure and unselfish, but the realities of life mean that much of our prayer seems to involve bargaining with God.) Last week we saw Abraham as the generous host (though I do wonder how long that calf dinner took to serve), while today he is the canny desert shepherd at a sheep auction, trying to get the best possible deal out of God, not indeed for himself, but on behalf of others.

God is about to destroy Sodom. Ah, you think, that's because it was a sexually dissolute place, but in fact the great sin of Sodom seems to have been disregard for the Law of Hospitality to Strangers, a central concern in Old Testament morality. Failure in hospitality (as towards Abraham's three visitors) was a serious matter, indicating that the people were mean and ungenerous. Abraham appreciates the sinfulness of the place, but thinks wiping it out is ham-fisted on God's part, and he is prepared to stand up for any possibly innocent people who might live there.

While being full of respect and reverence for God, Abraham is not deterred from pointing out the consequences of an over-hasty reaction, and God is prepared to listen. Abraham pleads that while the city might be rotten, not everyone in it is corrupt. If there are only fifty good men then destroying the city will kill them as well as the guilty. God agrees, and for the sake of the fifty, the city will not be destroyed. Having won the first round, Abraham goes on with a succession of lower figures, and God agrees to all his requests, but even ten just men could not be found in Sodom.

Here we have a fine example of Prayer of Intercession on behalf of others. God is presented as someone who responds, listens and hears our pleading. How often do we think or hear people say "I might as well be talking to the wall"? No; Abraham's (and our) God is taking it all in and responding in love. God is shown as being swayed by a good argument.

Let us remember this Old Testament story, and be persistent in prayer if we want God to do something for us.

Did you know.... Pope Francis has established 1st September as the World Day of Prayer for the Care of Creation, encouraging the Catholic community around the world to pray for our common home. The World Day of Prayer is inspired by his landmark encyclical *Laudato Si'*, which calls on "every person living on this planet" to care for our shared earth. Pope Francis calls us all to celebrate this opportune moment "to reaffirm [our] personal vocation to the stewards of creation, to thank God for the wonderful handiwork which he has entrusted to our care, and to implore his help for the protection of creation, as well as his pardon for the sins committed against the world in which we live."
