Cremation Liturgy

Introductory Rites

Fr Geoffrey Steel, parish priest of St Mary & St James, Scorton, leads the sign of the cross, and then greets all who have gathered.

The grace of our Lord Jesus Christ, the love of God, and the communion of the Holy Spirit be with you all.

And with your spirit.

Fr Geoffrey sprinkles the coffin with water saying:

In the waters of baptism

Joan died with Christ and rose with him to new life.

May she now share with Christ eternal glory.

After words of introduction, Fr Geoffrey says:

We believe that all the ties of friendship and affection which knit us as one throughout our lives do not unravel with death.

Confident that God always remembers the good we have done and forgives our sins, in the silence of our hearts, let us pray for Joan, asking God to gather her to himself.

Pause for silent prayer.

Almighty God and Father, it is our certain faith

that your Son, who died on the cross, was raised from the dead, the firstfruits of all who have fallen asleep.

Grant that through this mystery your servant Joan, who has gone to her rest in Christ, may share in the joy of his resurrection.

We ask this through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, God for ever and ever.

Amen.

Scripture Reading: 1 John 3:1-2

A reading from the first letter of Saint John.

We shall see God as God really is.

Think of the love that the Father has lavished on us by letting us be called God's children; and that is what we are.

Prayer of Commendation and the Committal

In the spirit of faith in the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, in the silence of our hearts for Joan, let us pray.

Pause for silence.

During the committal the coffin may be removed from view.

Into your hands, Father of mercies, we commend Joan in the sure and certain hope that, together with all who have died in Christ, she will rise with him on the last day.

We give you thanks for the blessings which you bestowed upon Joan in this life: they are signs to us of your goodness and of our communion with the saints in Christ.

Merciful Lord, turn towards us and listen to our prayers: open the gates of paradise to your servant and help us who remain to comfort one another with assurances of faith, until we all meet in Christ and are with you and with Joan for ever.

We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

Pause for silence

Intercessions

Fr Geoffrey leads the prayers, composed by Louise and Clare.

Dear friends, in reverence let us pray to God, the source of all mercies.

For Joan:

we thank God for the happy life she had; may God reward her with peace for the good she did, and reunite her with family and friends who have died before her. Lord in your mercy.

Lord III your mercy

Hear our prayer.

For Joan's family and friends: may God fill their hearts with treasured memories and their minds with hope, as they look to the future. Lord in your mercy.

Hear our prayer.

For all who helped to support Joan, and all who dedicate their lives to the care of others: may they continue to use their knowledge and skills to bring comfort and ease to all who are suffering. Lord in your mercy.

Hear our prayer.

For all mothers and grandmothers:

with thanksgiving, we pray that Joan's example of motherhood will continue through those who have witnessed it. Lord in your mercy.

Hear our prayer.

Let us pray also for ourselves, on our own pilgrimage through life: may the Lord keep us faithful in his service. Lord in your mercy.

The Lord's Prayer

Fr Geoffrey introduces the Lord's Prayer, which all recite together.

Our true home is in heaven; let us pray to the heavenly Father as Jesus taught his disciples.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name; thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil.

Concluding Prayer

Fr Geoffrey leads the concluding prayer of the liturgy.

Lord God,
whose days are without end
and whose mercies beyond counting,
keep us mindful that life is short and the hour of death unknown.
Let your spirit guide our days on earth
in the ways of holiness and justice,
that we may serve you
in union with the whole Church,
secure in faith, strong in hope, perfected in love.
And when our earthly journey is ended,
lead us rejoicing into your kingdom,
where you live for ever and ever.

Prayer over the People

Bow your heads for God's blessing.

All pray silently.

Fr Geoffrey, with hand outstretched over the people, says:

Merciful Lord, you know the anguish of the sorrowful, you are attentive to the prayers of the humble. Hear your people who cry out to you in their need, and strengthen their hope in your lasting goodness.

We ask this through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.

Eternal rest grant unto her, O Lord.

And let perpetual light shine upon her.

May she rest in peace.

Amen.

May her soul and the souls of all the faithful departed through the mercy of God, rest in peace.

Amen.

May the peace of God, which is beyond all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son, Jesus Christ our Lord.

Amen.
