Receiving Holy Communion

When receiving Holy Communion, please:

- Make a bow of reverence before receiving the Sacrament.
- Have your palms open one on top of another, forming a throne.
- Have them as level as possible and relaxed.
- We have resumed the personal dialogue at Communion with each communicant: "The Body of Christ. Amen." Please note that facecoverings are still required.

If you're fairly recently returned to Mass: welcome back; it is good to see you once again. You might wish to take a copy of the *Order of Mass* to enable you to pray the Apostles' Creed and, perhaps, to say the *I confess* as part of your own preparation for Mass. Mark the copy with your name, and retain it for your personal use.

First Holy Communion

Next Sunday, 20 June, at the 10.30am Mass, Lewis Rennie-Bloor will make his First Holy Communion. Please keep Lewis and his family in your prayers during these final days of preparation.

Musings from my hermitage...

After the special readings for Lent and Easter, Trinity, and the Body & Blood of Christ, this Sunday we're back to listening to the Gospel according to St Mark. His main interest is the person of Jesus, how gradually Jesus showed people who he is, revealed to them God's vision, and invited them to respond to him with all their heart.

In public, our Lord taught with parables: he wanted people to think for themselves, to reach their own conviction about who he is. Only with his chosen disciples did he speak directly.

Part of St Mark's concern is to explain why God's chosen people rejected Jesus; why they continued to reject the Good News preached by Mark and his fellow believers. So Mark brings out the mysteriousness in our Lord's parables; why he has Jesus explain things in private, and to his chosen few.

The image of seeds, silently growing while folk sleep, and the picture of the tiny mustard seed, are both parables of contrast. St Mark contrasts the insignificant beginnings of our Lord's ministry with the final, cosmic event: the glorious coming of the kingdom of God.

Parables like these can offer easy encouragement. The Church in our land has far fewer members than some decades back. We could interpret the parables to reassure ourselves that, in the long run, everything will be alright. But that's not how Mark uses the parables. What he was telling his fellow believers very much applies to us.

The Church is not itself the kingdom of God. Rather, the Church is the family, the context where people can find signs of hope, discover pointers which direct them to the kingdom of God. The Church is a body of people who live the values of God's kingdom: people who serve, committed to justice, to prayer and the worship of God; who work to bring folk together and build relationships. Numbers are not in our hands. What is in our hands is the quality of our own response.
