### Sunday – *it is our day*

The Bishops' Conference has issued a statement on the central importance of celebrating Sunday, The Lord's Day. The statement is included with the printed newsletters and is on our parish website.

The Bishops say, "It is our continuing judgement ... that it is not possible at the present time for all of the faithful to attend Mass on a Sunday thus fulfilling their duty to God. It is hoped that it will be possible for all Catholics in England and Wales to fulfil this most important Church precept, that of the Sunday Obligation, by the First Sunday of Advent 2021."

With this in mind, and perhaps to enable more parishioners to attend than are currently able to, I'd like us to consider moving our Saturday morning Mass to Saturday evening, at its former time of 6.00pm.

We already have stewards, musicians, Readers, and Ministers of Holy Communion arranged for Saturday mornings until the end of August; and so I suggest that we move our Saturday Mass to the evening beginning 4 September. I welcome your reflections. *Fr Geoffrey*

## Musings from my hermitage

In chapter six of John's gospel, Jesus is struggling against people's misunderstanding. They don't seem to be able to read what John calls "the signs". Jesus is willing people to look beyond what they can see with their eyes; he longs for them to "Believe in the One [whom God] has sent."

Centuries earlier, in the wilderness, the Hebrews had been fed by the miracle of manna; they still died. But Jesus offers something never seen before: the bread of heaven, true and lasting nourishment for the human heart and soul, for the human being. "Whoever eats this bread will live for ever."

Through God's Holy Spirit, the One who was crucified gives his flesh and blood to nourish and sustain us still. The Holy Spirit gathers us as Christ's living Body; inspires the scriptures as the living word of God; and, in the eucharistic prayer, transforms bread and wine into the living Christ.

Yet the ultimate focus of the Mass is the transformation of ourselves. We pray "... that, partaking of the body and blood of Christ, we may be gathered into one by the Holy Spirit" [EP2]; "... become one body, one spirit in Christ" [EP3]; "... a living sacrifice in Christ to the praise of [God's] glory" [EP4].

In the eucharistic prayer, we offer ourselves to God in the sacrifice of Christ; and we make this prayer of the whole Church our own singing an 'Amen' which is to be truly great and full of faith.

Here in the Mass, God rouses us from sleep like he roused the prophet Elijah. God feeds us with his life-giving word, and with the bread of heaven, the body and blood of Christ. Restored, we continue our journey of faith, and witness with fresh energy, renewed commitment. The sacred mysteries always send us back to our homes and families, our neighbourhoods and places of work, to continue Christ's work.

In the rough and tumble of everyday life, you and I continue the miracle of transformation begun here in the eucharist. Close up, it's hard to see. Real life, real problems, real pain and loss, can seem no easier or lighter after Mass than they did before. But God is crafting a vision, and you and I are part of God's divine plan.
