Musings from my hermitage ... Fr Geoffrey

Peter recognising Jesus as the Christ is found in all the gospels. But the verse about Peter as the rock, and the mention of the Church, are only in St Matthew. Several times already in this gospel, Peter's been the spokesman for the others. St Matthew certainly makes Peter stand out among the group.

I imagine that Peter was called "rock" because of his character, personality. Did Jesus use Peter's nickname to define Peter's role: he's to serve as the rock of the community? Reliable, secure, solid.

What Jesus says about keys echoes Isaiah's prophecy in the first reading for this Sunday. Eliakim was given command over the gate of the royal palace: he controlled who entered, who left. In the gospel, Peter was given charge over the gate of the kingdom of heaven. Jesus named Peter 'chief steward' of the kingdom. It's a powerful image of service that's the heart of the gospel: serving God, serving neighbour, serving the poor — all in the name of Christ.

In this episode with Peter, Matthew's telling us that the powers opposed to God, even death, will not triumph over the community of Jesus' disciples. It's an encouraging message for us to take to heart in these times that have so upset the familiar pattern and practice of Church worship, life, and witness.

In essence, the Church is the assembly, the gathering of Jesus' disciples; that's who we are; that's what we're called ever more to become and to be.

Gathering together is crucial to St Matthew's picture of what it means to be the Church. Faith in Jesus is deeply personal; private prayer and reading the Bible for ourselves, crucial. But there's also this other dimension: gathering together, we encourage one another in faith and service; gathering together faithfully builds the body of Christ. Gathering is a serious act of witness: we are making Christ all the more visible in the world.

Gathering and worshipping together is the essence of who we are; and how we best live that in our current situation over the (many?) months ahead will require imagination and creativity. Because we are all of us more secure the more we are linked together, gathered on the rock that is Peter.
