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## Musings from my hermitage ... Fr Geoffrey

Rejoice! is the keynote of this third Sunday of Advent: the prophet Isaiah rejoices because God has clothed him in “the garments of salvation” — Imagine how they looked. God had wrapped Isaiah “in the cloak of integrity” — Imagine how that might feel.

The voice of Isaiah, the voice of John the Baptist cry out in today’s wilderness: to hearts troubled by feelings of inadequacy, to souls battered by the message that we’re supposed to be richer, more powerful, better dressed, a different shade, slimmer, younger, fitter, oh, and happier.

But the word of God speaks a different language, has another way of measuring. The Saviour has good news for the poor, Christ gives true liberty to captives; Jesus fills the starving with good things. God’s vision is coming to birth. That’s why we can rejoice even if our own personal circumstances are tinged, even overwhelmed with sadness.

John came “as a witness to testify to the light so that all might believe through him”. John prepared people to recognise Christ in their midst; Christ present, active, working, healing, saving in their midst. “Of all those born of women, a greater than John the Baptist has never been seen.” That’s how highly Jesus rated John. But he went on: “Yet even the least in the kingdom is greater than [John].” That’s how highly Christ rates you and me.

John thought himself unworthy even to be the lowest grade of slave — not worthy even to untie the master’s sweaty sandal. Yet the same master trusts us to share his mission: to bring good news, soothe broken hearts, help people to be truly free, “to proclaim ... the Lord’s favour”. Is that how I understand my life as a Catholic Christian? Do other people see that in me?

The Advent liturgy urges us to renew our relationship with God. Dare I let God move within every fibre of my being, as Mary did? let God inspire my every thought and word and deed? direct all my relationships? Not just for our own good, but so that we might boldly proclaim Christ’s presence to people who are hungry for God, even if they don’t know it.
