Welcome back to Mass

Changing guidelines. Following the Government's easing of restrictions on 17 May, our Bishops have revised their directives for parish life and worship. From the point of view of the congregation, these are the things that you'll notice. Thank you, Fr Geoffrey.

- Readers no longer need to sanitise their hands before and after reading.
- We will resume the personal dialogue at Communion with each communicant: "The Body of Christ. Amen." Please note that facecoverings are still required.
- At Garstang there will be an additional minister of Holy Communion.

If you're fairly recently returned to Mass: welcome back; it is good to see you once again. You might wish to take a copy of the *Order of Mass* to enable you to pray the Apostles' Creed and, perhaps, to say the *I confess* as part of your own preparation for Mass. Mark the copy with your name, and retain it for your personal use.

Receiving Holy Communion

When receiving Holy Communion, please:

- Make a bow of reverence before receiving the Sacrament.
- Have your palms open one on top of another, forming a throne.
- Have them as level as possible and relaxed.

Musings from my hermitage

The feast of Corpus Christi first appeared in Belgium during the 13th century. It expressed people's devotion to the presence of Christ in the consecrated bread of the eucharist. The leadership of the Church promoted the feast to counter certain questions about the eucharistic presence of Christ that were then being raised.

At that time, and for many centuries, people received the sacrament of holy communion only rarely. Instead, they nourished their eucharistic faith through gazing upon the host at the consecration of the Mass. Out of their desire, developed a whole range of eucharistic devotions: exposition of the blessed sacrament; benediction; processions. To this day, devotion to the presence of Christ in the sacrament of the eucharist remains a key dimension of Catholic life.

The scriptures place the eucharist at the heart of our discipleship. Gathering together for the reading of scripture and 'the breaking of bread' has been an essential mark of discipleship from earliest times. The members of Christ's body gather; we give thanks to God; remember the dying and rising of our Saviour; we call down the Holy Spirit upon our gathering, and upon the bread and wine we'll share; we break the bread; we eat and drink, as the Lord commanded. Why? That we will be nourished and strengthened in the faith of our baptism. Whatever 'the world' thinks, and thinks of us, we "proclaim the death of the Lord until he comes."

The eucharist is the pivot of our discipleship, because the Mass sends us back into the world: to continue Christ's work for the kingdom of God; building relationships; healing not harming; loving not hating; caring not ignoring.

This is why, in the eucharistic prayer, we pray for the transformation not just of the bread and wine, but of ourselves: that "we who are nourished by the body and blood of [Christ] and filled with his Holy Spirit, may become one body, one spirit in Christ." We pray that Christ will make us "an eternal offering to [God]", faithful and courageous disciples whose prayer, and worship, and witness, draw others into the kingdom of God.
