Message from Pope Francis

"I can imagine you in your families, living an unusual life to avoid contagion. I am thinking of the liveliness of children and young people, who cannot go out, attend school, live their lives.

"I have in my heart all the families, especially those who have a loved one who is sick, or who have unfortunately experienced mourning due to the coronavirus or other causes. These days I often think about people who are alone, and for whom it is more difficult to face these moments. Above all I think of the elderly, who are very dear to me. ...

"I also remember how many are in financial straits and are worried about work and the future. ...

"Let us try, if we can, to make the best use of this time: let us be generous; let us help those in need in our neighbourhood; let us look out for the loneliest people, perhaps by telephone or social networks; let us pray to the Lord for those who are in difficulty. ... Even if we are isolated, thought and spirit can go far with the creativity of love. This is what we need today: the creativity of love. This is what is needed today: the creativity of love."

The Pope ended by urging people to "prepare for better times".

Musings from my hermitage ... Fr Geoffrey

My daily walk six times around the grounds here in Garstang is thirty minutes. Taking that same walk each day, I began to notice the subtle changes: buds growing and beginning to burst; the soft green leaves on the copper beech that weren't out yesterday; bright red berries almost hidden by the hedge; the fresh flowers on a grave.

The virus that is killing people is part of the same creation that gives us life, brings cheer to our heart and comfort to our soul. ... Such is the wonder.

At Easter, "when heaven is wedded to earth," the wonder of God is proclaimed for all the world.

That wonder came first to the women of the gospel. The others had scattered; but the women went to the tomb. They'd seen Jesus die, and expected to find his tomb closed, guarded. But the stone had been rolled back.

These women were the first to proclaim the Easter message. And once the other disciples had met their Risen Lord, they announced the message to yet more folk. And in proclaiming that good news, they themselves were transformed and energised by it.

It's the same for every generation of Christian: each of us personally has to come to know and experience the risen Lord.

We meet the Lord when we allow his word to enlighten, challenge, and change us, his body and blood to nourish and sustain us; when we let him meet us daily in prayer; and allow ourselves to meet him in the flesh and blood of our fellow human beings.

Let us also allow Christ to meet us in our own flesh and blood, in the depth of our being, in that place where we want least to be disturbed.

In the resurrection of Christ, God has unlocked the grip of death and all its consequences. Everything we might fear is robbed of its power over us.

Because Jesus is risen, when we mourn, or are visited by the ghost of loss, we will find comfort; when we hunger and thirst for what is right, we will be satisfied.

Because Jesus is risen, it's the gentle who will inherit the earth; and the pure in heart who'll behold God's face.

Because Jesus is risen, our restless human heart will know peace; even night will be a time of hope; and the Risen Christ will light our day, brightly.

Stay safe. Be well. Keep the flame of Easter faith alive in your heart.

Jesus is risen, and will see us through these troubled times.
