Musings from my hermitage ... Fr Geoffrey

How do we reconcile ourselves with 2020, the year that robbed us of our plans, our holidays, our liberty? We lost time with our loved ones and, for many people, their loved ones died. Can we allow God to bring healing and peace into the depth of our being?

The first reading for the Feast of Mary, Mother of God – New Year's Day – was a blessing. We began the calendar year reminded that God is a God of blessings. The more we grow aware of God's blessing in our life, the more we're able to receive it humbly, and with gratitude. God gives freely; and the more we sense that God shines his face on us and is gracious to us, the more we're stirred to look kindly on others, find ways to be gracious especially to those who don't necessarily expect a kindly face.

The shepherds in the Christmas story were considered outsiders, thought to be low class and dishonest. The blessing for them was that they heard the good news, accepted it, and believed. When they reached Bethlehem, "they repeated what they'd been told about [the child], and everyone who heard it was astonished". The shepherds received a blessing and shared it.

The blessing came to the shepherds while they were at work. I don't imagine they thought that night was going to be special. Certainly they didn't do anything to earn God's blessing. They weren't in a 'holy place'; we're not told they were praying. The shepherds were just doing their job. In the midst of that ordinariness, God blessed them, shone his face on them, and was gracious to them.

God reaches out to us in the very ordinary circumstances of life, even in the challenging circumstances of last year and in the demanding conditions of the coming months. When the gospel tells us that Mary "pondered these things in her heart", the implication is that she doesn't fully understand. So let Mary be a guide for us. Her response encourages us to take things in, reflect on them, and ask God to help us understand.
